The Poor

Survival of these records is patchy and rare before the eighteenth century.

County Archives may hold:

Accounts of the Overseers of the Poor

Lists of Parish Apprentices – included girls

Records of private charities

Documents created by Settlement Legislation of 1662:

Settlement Examinations—details of J.P.'s interviews with a person whose settlement is in doubt—potted biography.

Settlement Bonds—promises by an individual to support a named newcomer should they need poor relief.

Removal Orders—issued by J.Ps ordering individuals back to their parish of settlement.

Settlement Certificate—from 1696/7. Issued by parish of settlement, promising to support individuals if necessary—meant those named could enter new parishes and seek work without being examined.

The Illegitimate

Documents created by the Bastardy Legislation of 1733 are:

Bastardy Examination—to discover the father of an illegitimate child.

Bastardy Warrant— instructions to apprehend putative fathers.

Bastardy Bond—promise by the father to pay maintenance for an illegitimate child.

Bastardy Examinations, Bonds and Warrants may survive in County Archives A few are online at Ancestry and FindmyPast
